#### HELP FOR THE UNITY OF TUSTIN BOARD of DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors has approved the formation of a new Advisory Committee to assist, at the Board's discretion, in providing rationale for the Board's decision making. The committee's five to seven appointees will be church members diverse in experience, respected and informed, who are willing to use their talents for the benefit of Unity of Tustin.

Unity of Tustin is a relatively small church community with limited administrative resources, and the new Advisory Committee will be able to take on projects to ease the research and fact-finding load, as requested. For example, the Committee could be asked to



research one or more projects currently before the Board and report its findings, and possibly its recommendations, to the Board, thus giving the Board more information for decision-making purposes. Of course, the Committee will have no voting power or decision-making authority outside of its own deliberations.

Beverley Campbell has been asked to chair the Committee which is still in its formative stage. Updates will be forthcoming.


### Celebrating the Spirit Group Experience

### The Evolution of the Meditation Gardens

The Meditation Gardens are the jewel of Unity of Tustin. People come to our campus and exclaim that they had no idea something like this existed in Orange County. Site Seven, the Glass Panorama of Religions, was the final site to be completed (2012). Maintenance and s mall improvements have continued over the years, but the gardens are now loudly calling us to continue its evolution.

Site One, the first sites to be completed, has subsequently been in need of re-imagining. Originally, it featured a wooden altar popular with termites. Because of its location, it's the focus of attention when beginning the tour as step one in the stages of awakening. The beautiful white angel with her torch remains steadfast, but the rest of the site, which should be a metaphor for the entry to the spiritual path, the point of "let there be light", requires reinvention.

Site Five is currently in need of the most attention. For many years, the koi pond filled this space with beautiful plants, a viewing platform, and of course, the vibrant, swirling koi fish. The fish represented "sea monsters" as described in this stage of awakening. In classical mysticism, this is the stage of the Dark Night of the Soul. This term has become popular in our culture to describe serious life challenges, or even mental illness, but this is not what a dark night means in classical mysticism. A dark night of the soul is when God appears to withdraw after the four other stages of awakening have been completed. This is particularly excruciating after we have come to know the unconditional love and guidance of the Divine, and our prayers and meditations feel empty and dry, devoid of comfort, as though we're simply going through the motions.

For a number of reasons, the gardens are not suited to support live creatures such as koi fish, so other visions are being born for Site 5. One possibility is a small amphitheater with tiers that represent a feeling of depth and invite us to simply sit, "awaiting the return of God." Another idea I got while watching the television show "Shogun" is to create a rock garden with sand around the perimeter. I watched devotees rake the sand in a circular pattern over and over and it reminded me of an external practice that mimics the internal sense of worldly resignation, the surrender that is our only recourse until "our divine connection returns."

On June 23, my talk will be about the Meditation Gardens and the various ways we can interpret the eight sites. As we contemplate how to allocate funds collected after retiring our mortgage, I'm putting forward the idea of using some of these funds to rehabilitate Sites One and Five. Our jewel in Orange County needs to shine brighter.

## Craig Stephen Phillips Road to Minsistry

I sometimes get asked what it was that led me to want to become a minister. The short answer is 9/11. All of us can remember that tragic day; where we were and who we were with when the news of the terrorist attacks happened in New York City. Like everyone, I was in a state of shock and disbelief as I watched the Twin Towers fall on live TV, and like everyone, I felt a strong sense of sadness and anger at what had befallen our country.



In the days that followed the events on 9/11, as my feelings of anger gave way to grief, I remember seeing stories in the news of people who wanted vengeance on the perpetrators of the attacks. As the calls for war grew louder and louder, there were even Christian Ministers who were calling for revenge in Jesus' name. Although by this time I was practicing buddhism and taoism, my own love and admiration for the teachings of Christ were very much a part of my own spiritual path. From my own deep experience of those teachings, I just couldn't understand how anyone, let along a Christian minister, could advocate for killing other human beings in the name of Jesus, or any other spiritual teacher.

These feelings of bewilderment grew in me, until one day while our for a run, I had what can only be described as an epiphany or spiritual revelation. I was overwhelmed by the inspiration to become a minister myself so that I could bring what I felt were the true teachings of Jesus; Love, forgiveness and compassion into a world that, in some instances, had completely twisted his message into something I couldn't even recognize. This feeling stayed with me for many days, and though it faded somewhat in the coming years, it never really left me.

During the next six years, the long and winding road of my life was to take me to the island of Kauai, where I lived for almost four years teaching the Taoist arts of Tai Chi and Qigong, and finally brought me full circle to my wish of serving God as an Interfaith Minister. In June of 2007 I enrolled in the country's first, and oldest Interfaith program at the New Seminary in New York City. I often think about what a perfect place it was for me to embark on my journey, the city from where my inspiration to be a minister had arisen out of the events of 9/11, a city that lives in me to this day.
